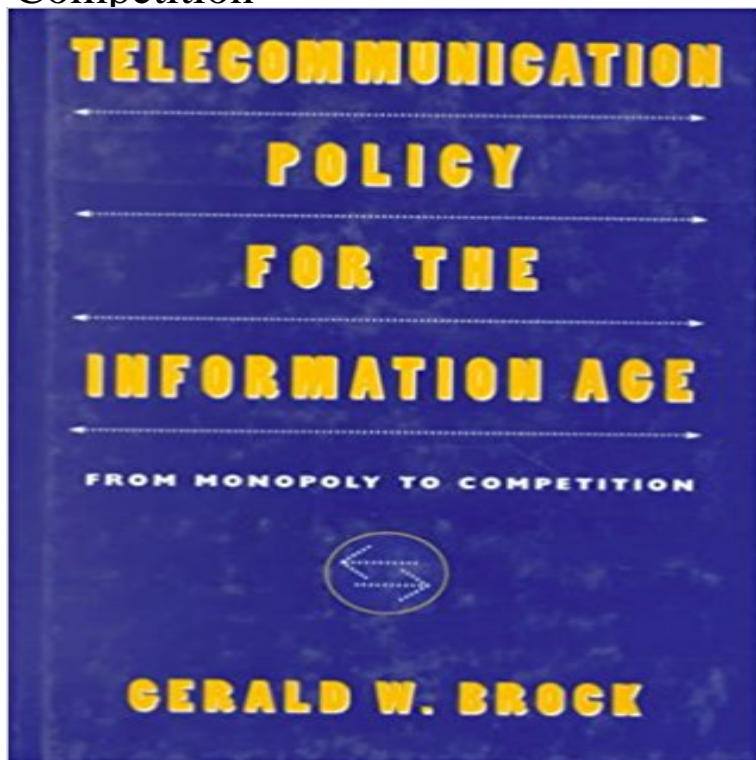


Telecommunication Policy for the Information Age: From Monopoly to Competition
